

Canine Influenza- has hit our area...

Dog Flu is a relatively new disease which can be caused by two different canine influenza viruses. Just like human flu is among humans, Dog Flu is highly contagious among dogs. In fact, unless a dog has already had the illness and recovered, almost every dog exposed to the virus will become infected. Two different strains of canine influenza virus have been isolated in the US. Canine influenza virus H3N8 was first reported in 2003, and canine influenza virus H3N2 emerged in March 2015. These strains are not related. Therefore, dogs at risk should be vaccinated against both strains.² This is because the viruses are relatively new, and dogs have no natural immunity to it. Nobivac® Canine Flu H3N8 was the first vaccine for Dog Flu and still is highly effective against this strain. It has been clinically proven to significantly reduce the severity of influenza and the length of time that a dog is sick.³³ The bivalent flu vaccine was licensed in October 2016 and is the first bivalent Dog Flu vaccine. This vaccine aids in the control of disease associated with Canine Influenza Virus H3N8 and H3N2 infection.

Canine influenza virus (CIV H3N8) has been confirmed in dogs across 43 states and the District of Columbia. In March 2015, a different canine influenza virus, CIV H3N2, caused an outbreak of canine influenza in Chicago. Within 5 months this virus spread to 23 states.¹ And because most dogs are naive to the virus, virtually every naive dog exposed will become infected.² Clinical signs associated with CIV can be confused with canine cough making accurate diagnosis difficult. Nobivac® Canine Flu H3N8 — a killed virus vaccine from Merck Animal Health — was the first vaccine fully licensed by the USDA for canine influenza. It significantly decreases clinical signs of disease and reduces viral shedding.

TRANSMISSION AND SYMPTOMS

CIV is transmitted by close contact with an infected dog, often in a restricted space such as an animal shelter, day care center, or boarding kennel. Casual contact is less likely to be a factor mainly due to the relatively low amount of virus shed by an infected dog. Virtually all dogs are susceptible regardless of age or breed.

Influenza virus infection in dogs follows a similar pattern to infections in other species. The onset of clinical signs will be 2-3 days post infection. Peak of virus shed is 3-4 days post infection. Longer shedding times of up to 24 days have been identified in dogs infected with H3N2. Because of the differences in the time dogs may shed virus, the quarantine of 7 days is recommended for dogs with H3N8 influenza, while a 21 day quarantine is recommended for dogs with H3N2 influenza. Dogs may continue to cough for several weeks following recovery from acute infection. While in the past CIV infections in and of themselves have not shown a significant mortality rate, CIV infections as well as other respiratory viruses compromise the normal defenses of the lung permitting secondary bacterial pneumonias.

BASH is being proactive with our vaccinations. A few shelters are vaccinating for both FLU's prior to us getting a dog. Most are not, so when we pull a dog we are vaccinating. The shot has to be boostered in 2-4 weeks to get the optimum resistance to both flu's. We also are offering to all foster homes to receive the shots for their personal dogs (recommended by our vet) at the same cost as BASH pays for the fosters. The PAWS clinic offers the shot for \$35 to the public (first and third Saturday of the month. Check website for locations PAWS4SJACS.org)

Talk to your vet on their recommendations if your dog(s) need the vaccine or not.

Valentine Dog Treats Recipes

HEART Treat

Ingredients:

4 strips crispy bacon, crumbled 1/2 cup shredded cheddar cheese

1 1/2 cups oatmeal

2 large eggs

Directions:

Pre-heat oven to 350 degrees.

Mix the bacon, cheese and oatmeal. You can use a mixer with a paddle or a chopper to make the pieces small.

Add eggs and blend until sticky.

Lay out on a layer of oats on a cutting board to prevent sticking and top with treat mixture. Use a heart-shaped cookie cutter to form as desired.

Bake approximately 20 minutes or until slightly golden. Let cool.



Treat Ingredients:

- 1 C whole wheat flour
- 1 C oats
- 1/2 to 1 C beef broth
- 1/4 C creamy peanut butter
- Dog bone cookie cutter

Frosting Ingredients:

- 1 1/2 packs (12 oz) nonfat cream cheese, room temp
- Two tsp honey *see note about honey below
- One tsp <u>vanilla</u>

Treat Directions:

- Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Line a cookie sheet with parchment paper.
- Blend flour and oats. Add 1/2 cup beef broth and peanut butter to the flour & oat combination. Mix well.
- Add more beef broth if needed to make a thick dough.
- Using your hands form the dough into a ball.
- Cover a cutting board and rolling pin with flour.
- Roll out to 1/4 inch, using the bone cookie cutter, cut out the treats
- Bake at 350 degrees for 10 minutes on each side or until golden brown.
- Cool completely on a wire rack.

Frosting Directions:

- Add the ingredients together.
- With a hand mixer beat until fluffy.
- Scoop the frosting into a piping bag with a #2 tip to outline the treats or make designs on them.
- Set them aside until the frosting has dried.


