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

Behavior testing at HSSV



Michelle did a fantastic talk about the evaluation of dogs at the Humane Society of Silicon Valley. She started with the general goals of HSSV. What can they provide for that dog? That the most important part is to evaluate a dog that it can be safely adopted or sent to rescue. They prefer to start the evaluation prior to the dog going into their "room". There are many steps that they use. There are two people that do the evaluation and in many cases they are re-evaluated after they have been there for a short period of time. They evaluate from their body language, touching, teeth exam, food text, dog to dog and more. Not any single test will cause them to not

make it to adoptions or rescue.

Most of us see the hair on our dog's backs go up... and she taught us that that is their way of "blushing". Most of us know by body language if it is good or bad...and Michelle confirmed that. Watch what else is going on. I realized that we also do that when we put a dog on a sled team...see how the dog reacts to others etc. She also talked about the use of the plastic hand to see if they are food aggressive. She gave us examples of extreme cases and cases when they knew that the dog just was playing with it and not being aggressive. They look at the dog's body language and not just the actual reaction.

When they do dog to dog introductions, each evaluator is watching the other person's dog. As they approach they are constantly talking to each other. The person walking the dog can't see what it is doing as well as the other person walking up to them. They start with the dogs 15 to 20 feet apart and work up to them being close to each other.

There were so many great things she said but I was busy listening and couldn't type it all in. Thanks Michelle for the great and information talk....





Juneau – Passing of a Friend

Juneau passed away on Saturday night May 2, let me tell you about a great little friend. We adopted Juneau in 2000. He had been dropped in a night box at the Hayward Animal Control. He was rescued by a member of BASH, who took him to Nobel Veterinarian for check up and neutered. We had lost our other Siberian Mishia, after 12 years, about 9 months prior and had asked Dr Nobel if he came across another for adoption to let us know. I received a call from Dr. Nobel telling me of a great Siberian pup he had in his office and I should come down to see him. It was love at first sight. Juneau was estimated to be 6 months old but we did not have a date of birth, so I gave him mine.

I took him home and notified my wife we had a new family member. As with any new member there was the usual problem of who was boss. I really don't know if this issue was ever established. Juneau was a talker; He had an opining on everything and gave it frequently. There were even times when I felt he was mumbling under his breath when I did not pay attention to him.

Through the years Juneau wormed his way into our lives and under our skins. Juneau was always with us. When we bought a new truck a stipulation was the need for a proper windowed camper shell for the back so he could ride with his head out the side. If the truck moved so did Juneau.

I could relate many incidents of his short life with us but the two that come to mind are the Halloween candy incident and the great frozen turkey theft. My wife and are both diabetics. We had a bag of candy, left over from Halloween, it disappeared one day. I thought my wife hide it and she thought I hide it. I was in the back patio calling Juneau to brush him when he arrived carrying a Milky Way candy bar in his mouth, still in its wrapper. I hurried to the back yard and found the candy bag ripped open and spread in the area he staked out for himself. My wife and I gathered up what remained and called the Vets office. We were advised he knew the dog and the candy and saw no problems other than we should not stand behind Juneau.

The next day Juneau came around to the patio and presented me with another Milky Way bar. My wife and I scoured the yard looking for any candy we might have missed with negative results.

The next day another Milky Way bar, this time I searched the area and seeing his favorite blanket I raised it up to see a cash of candy bars fall out. He had hidden them in his blanket.

The second incident was the great Turkey theft. My wife was defrosting a turkey on the kitchen counter on a metal tray. I was in front room when I heard a crash and went to check the noise. I found the metal tray on the floor and asked my wife what she had on it?

She advised the 22 lb. turkey.

I told her it was gone now and headed out to the back yard. Around the side of the house Juneau had the turkey in his mouth and seeing me started to take up defense stance to defend his prize. I told him to drop the turkey which he refused to do. I cornered him by the fence and he dropped the turkey. I should advise that I'm disabled and walk with the aid of a cane. To keep him from regaining the turkey I had to place my foot on the turkey hold onto the fence for support and still keep Juneau from regain his prize. My wife arrived at this time and was reduced to laugher at the sight of me with the turkey held down with my foot and waving my cane at Juneau to keep him from it. Due to the damage to the Turkey, after my efforts to regain it, my wife decided she did not want to cook the turkey and it was thrown away.


Juneau had not been in snow so we decided to take him to the Sierras during a storm to see how he would react. We arrived and let him out of the truck. My wife walked him across the snow and as long as it was just to his feet he was fine, but he crossed to a soft patch and sunk up to his belly. He backed out, turning towards the truck and pulling my wife jumped into the back. He look at us as if to say I've had enough, if you want me to get involved in dog sledding I want to ride. Throughout his life Juneau suffered from epileptic seizures that happened about once a month. But theses did not affect his personality or his behavior around people or other animals. With the exception of his wanting to chase the cat, which he never caught, he was very friendly and playful with other dogs. He was the official greeter at our home to everyone who visited.. The neighbor kids would come



and ask if Juneau could come out to play they thought he was a lot of fun. He leaves a large hole in our life, but many fond memories

Come one, come all, for the dogs, dogs, dogs! There will be show dogs, rescue dogs, puppies, veteran dogs and all sorts of sled dogs – **Malamutes, Huskies, Samoyeds**, and **mixes** of these breeds.

A fun match is just that – an opportunity to have fun with your dog, with other people who love dogs and enjoy some great outdoor fun. You don't have to know what you are doing either! There will be judging like you see on Animal Planet's breed competitions. If you have never tried this but want to, this is the place to give it a whirl.

AKC registered dogs will be judged in formal **conformation** classes, all the other dogs will be in the spay/neuter confirmation of that breed, or the more general "Sled Dog" class. Classes will be held for **puppies**, adults and **veterans**.

If your dog likes to pull, you may want to let them try a **weight pull** – many sled dogs enjoy pulling. We may also have dog carts there that your dog might be able to try. Also see "Canine Good Citizen" (**CGC**): a certification program that is designed to reward dogs who have good manners at home and in the community.

There will also be **trainer presentations**, **handling classes**, a **parade of rescues**, and a chance to talk with other sled dog owners - sharing tales (or tails), raffles, auctions and other fun activities. Come have fun!

Traveling North on I-680 you would need to exit at Stone Valley East and turn right at the stop sign. The park will be on your right hand side about 1.5 miles down the road.

Traveling South on I-680 you would need to take the Stone Valley Road EAST exit. The park will be on yourright hand side about 1.5 miles down the road.

It is located next to Monte Vista High School and you may park in the school parking lot.

Through out the summer we cart with our dogs by moonlight. It is a fun time with our dogs getting exercise, learning to work with a team and as a team.

We meet around 5 pm on Saturday night and if the weather allows, we run the dogs between 7 and 9 pm. If it is warm we eat dinner first and then run them. They run from 1 mile to 7 miles, again it is based on the weather... the warmer it is the shorter we run. In the past 5 years of doing this event we have been unable to run 3 times. Dinner is a group effort.

Some people then camp in tents but most campout in their cars or beside them.

In the morning we rise with the sun and run the dogs again. We try different dogs in different positions and come back to a GREAT group breakfast and off the hill by 11 am.... You still have time to do things before the end of the weekend.

Most people go up for the whole event. SOMETIMES (not all the time) we have a couple that only come up for the evening part. This can only happen if we have at least two cars going down at the same time.

Time to meet- 5 pm at the lowest gate (there are three locked gates so we have to stay together)


