May 9th Hike ~ Land of Medicine Buddha.

Meet with our dogs at Soquel School, for coffee, tea, OJ, and breakfast snacks by 8:30, and from there we'll proceed over to Land of Medicine Buddha. If parking is an issue, we'll work out carpooling up to the trailheads. This is a religious retreat center that opens its 100 acres of trails up to hikers from the general public, and most people enjoy this beautiful area a lot. While on the grounds, they ask you to be respectful, not kill anything (including insects!) or use any

alcohol or drugs.

Directions to Land of the Medicine Buddha Retreat Center , 5800 Prescott Road, Soquel .

From Highway 17 south in Santa Cruz, take exit 1 B and merge onto Highway 1 (Cabrillo Highway) South toward Watsonville. At Soquel (3.7 Mile) take the Porter Street/Bay Avenue Exit No. 437 and turn left under freeway, go .2 mi Turn right onto Soquel Street. .4 Mile turn left onto North Main Street. Stay on Main Street to 3400 Main Street Elementary School on the right, and look for us.

To proceed onward, go back onto Main Street and proceed in the same direction, north, until Main merges into Glenhaven Road. Continue on Glenhaven for ½ mile. Turn right onto Prescott Rd. Follow Prescott Road all the way to the end, cross the wooden bridge, turn left and follow the signs to Land of Medicine Buddha. Parking there is limited. There is a walk down along Bates creek (about 3 hours), as well as a more gentle "8 verses" meditation walk at the retreat proper.

Bring 6 foot leashes, the usual dog-walking supplies including dog water, and water/snacks for yourself for for later in the day.

Wear comfortable shoes, dress in layers, bring sunscreen. Weather is going to be VERY warm on Friday, cooling back down to cool normal May temperatures by Saturday morning and there could be morning clouds and a breeze.

When we know a count of people, we will send out what to bring for dinner or breakfast.





Almaden Quicksilver Country Park

Sunday's Husky Hike to Almaden Quicksilver County Park was another successful adventure for 7 lucky people and 7 lucky dogs. Sadly, we didn't have cameras so we don't have photos, words will have to do. Dennis and I rolled into the Hicks Road/Wood Road entry point at ten to eight and set up coffee, and just as I was pouring my first cup the rest of the BASH people and pets arrived. Without too much delay, we set out on the trail towards English Camp at a pretty brisk pace – the dogs were happy to pull us along the rolling terrain. Of course, pokey me ambled along at a much more reasonable pace at the rear, wishing I had thought to bring a camera to take photos of the spectacular scenery. Last week's rains had really freshened and softened the vegetation, and removed dust from the tree leaves so that you could see the thin brilliant leaf edges that let you know it's spring, and all the growth enzymes are pumping. One steep hillside coming down to the road was at an angle just right to catch the morning sun in the dew on the grass, so that it sparkled like fairy dust, and the light caught spiderwebs that looked like white silk hammocks in the weeds. And of course, the sky was blue, there was a half moon, lots of flowers in bloom, and everything smelled very fresh and green and floral.

Oh, and I saw lots of deer tracks (some big ones, too!) in the dried road mud, and Bob said the saw six toed impressions looked like large cat tracks.

The rest of the crowd went along around the Castellero loop (named after the Spanish soldier from Mission Santa Clara who 'found' the original mine from information from the Ohlone Indians who used the cinnabar as red pigment) for the full five mile hike, while I walked along and met them on their way back at English camp, where there were some tables in deep shade for snacks and hydration that we bought along. There had been a mine, large grade school, and later a CCC conservation camp at the sight, according to the markers and interpretive signs.

We took the Yellow Kid Trail (named after the Yellow Kid Mine Tunnel which was named after a popular 1880's cartoon character that was an Irish Immigrant boy that wore a yellow shirt) back to Wood Road. The trail name was apt, because it was lined with tall yellow broom in bloom, honeysuckle, and orange poppies.

By this time, as Nicole said, "Malikai was on a mission!" and the dogs were towing people pretty briskly back to the parking lot, where they found comfy places to lie down in the shade and got more water. I found the last section of the return pretty strenuous, and thought that maybe we had pushed our endurance a little bit going up the last grade before the parking lot, but by the time we got back (just before 1:00) everybody seemed pretty happy with the walk (they are indeed in better shape than I am) and planning for another one.

I believe the weather was just about perfect for this hike at the start, but about noon it was maybe pushing the high 70's and getting a bit warm for our fur people. I don't think it would be a good husky hike much later this season, but if you have a chance, go in the next week or two, maybe on a cool day, while everything is in bloom. Not recommended for a husky hike in summer, though.

Strawberry Coconut Butter Dog Ice Cream

Ingredients:

32 oz. tub plain yogurt1/2 c. pure coconut butter1 c. fresh strawberries, washed and dried

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To Make:

1. Add yogurt, strawberries, and coconut butter to a blender, blending until smooth.

2. Pour mixture into a freezer-safe container. To make individual portions, pour into ice cube trays or small food-safe containers.

3. Cover and freeze for several hours or up to a day before serving.

4. Once frozen, scoop single servings into your dog's favorite bowl! Store leftovers in the freezer.

Makes approximately 4.5 – 5 cups.

We are participating in Maddie's fund again this year. Please mark your calendars for May 30 and 31. This year they are


