A Trip to the Siberian Nationals By Marie Stevens

Siberian Nationals, AKA the Rockford Rendezvous, took place in Rockford, Illinois, a couple of weeks ago.

Randee, Peggy Rusher, and I flew off to attend. I have only been to one other really big dog show before, so I had some knowledge of what would happen, but not a lot. It seems that every event has its own personality, as this show was quite a bit different than the last one I attended. We landed at O'Hare in Chicago early evening. It was dark and started to rain while we were there. We got our rental car and started the drive off to Rockford, about 1 1/2 hrs drive away. Randee had the route



programmed into her GPS, so no problem, right? Oops.....the GPS got scrambled on the flight and wasn't working! Rain, dark, Chicago traffic, confusing road signs....you can imagine what happened. After several loops around the same stretch of road, as we tried to figure out where to go, a cab driver took pity on us. We were making a U turn to try again, and he stopped and offered help. God bless the



man....we would still be circling if he hadn't stopped. Once we got on the right freeway, we made good time and make it to our destination. By then it was 10 or so at night, and we hadn't eaten yet. We figured we would check into the hotel and then go eat. As luck would have it, the hotel was just as confusing as the freeway system, and we had no GPS to help us there either. Eventually someone who saw us wandering around gave us directions and we did find our rooms.

Turns out there was a half floor between the first floor and the second floor, and that is where we needed to go.

The next day the show began....tons of gorgeous Siberians in lots of different colors. I'm not sure how many dogs were there...several hundred I'm sure. And lots of

different booths with merchandise of Siberian oriented things!!! Shoppers paradise. What more could anyone want? We would watch the show for a while, then shop, then watch, then eat, then shop, then watch,.....etc. You get the picture. They had Agility Trials as well, and something called Rally (which looked like Agility to me.....I'm not sure of all the differences.) This was held outside on the tennis court. I loved this part. The huskies were quite capable of doing all that was



required, and some did it beautifully. (If you have never seen Agility, it involves some jumping over jumps, going through some tunnels, going over a teeter-totter, and a variety of other things, in a specified order. It is timed and the one who does it the best and the fastest wins.) The Siberians LOVED it. They just didn't necessarily like to do it in the required order. They would go bounding off, tails high, tongues hanging out, and race around jumping things, going through tunnels, whatever they felt like, while their owners chased after them. The dogs were clearly having a ball...the owners seemed less enthralled. Eventually, though, we had to go in, because it was in the high 30s or low 40s and we got very cold.

The next day we got up bright and early and went out to a local park to watch the "Gig Races"...that is, cart races. They had 30...yes,



30....teams entered. They had 2-dog, 4-dog, and 6-dog teams. There was every kind of cart imaginable there. Randee took pictures of a lot of the carts so we could share this with you all. Randee helped monitor one of the trickier corners out on the course, with Wayne Curtis, Iditarod musher, while Peggy and I helped hold the teams at the start. This was great fun. These were the same dogs that were in the show rings, which was fun too. They really took off fast, skidding around on the wet grass (which quickly got muddy as more and more teams took off). Someone had made a cardboard cutout of a musher and sled team, which was placed in the grass near the end of the race. Lots of the teams slowed there to look it over, and several went over to sniff and pee on it. A bit of a distraction, but funny to watch. We froze that morning too.....we hadn't really planned on being outside so much and didn't bring our heavy duty cold clothes. But I wouldn't have missed it for anything. Then back

to the hotel for more dog watching, eating, shopping, raffles, etc.... there was always something going on.

We came back on Sunday, getting up early and driving back to Chicago. Our flight didn't leave til the early evening, so we planned to do a little sightseeing. However, we found out that the Chicago marathon was taking place that morning, so lots of downtown was blocked off. We spent time....you guessed it.....going around in circles trying to find a place to park so we could see some of the city. Once we finally got parked, we decided the best thing to do would be a boat tour of the river that runs through much of Chicago. This was really interesting and we learned a lot about the architecture of the city. We saw lots of expensive real estate, had some snacks on the boat, andyup.....froze once again.

My overall message is that the Nationals are great fun. The 2007 show will be in Rohnert Park, near Santa Rosa, so it won't involve flying anywhere, or long hotel stays (although those are fun too). I encourage all of you to go for some portion of the event; I'm sure we will be involved in helping out at the event too. I am really looking forward to it. The 2007 show will have its own personality, and will be different in many ways from any other, which is what makes it so much fun and so interesting. Keep this in the back of your mind!!!


Umunhum Run VII

SLED DRAWING

This sled was donated to BASH by Dianna Wallace. She saw it in Oregon and thought about all of is. It is a Risdon sled.

A little about the maker:

Clyde Risdon says he can't stand to watch a big sled dog race. "I can stand to watch them hook up 4-, 6-, and 8-dog teams and it doesn't bother me" Clyde says. "But when they hook up the open teams, I want to join them."

Clyde who raced sled dogs during the 1970s has since funneled his competitive energy into the construction of dog sleds and gigs. Clyde started building 3-wheel carts in 1972 and dog sleds in 1979. This was after many discussions with the top or professional racers of the day on what they did or did not like about the sled and training 'gigs' they had.

It was a conscious decision to start manufacturing quality dog sleds for the professional racer. Equipment that could be depended upon to perform. Clyde stills relies on feedback from mushers like Dee Dee and Mike Jonrowe, Lloyd and Mary Gilbertson, Rob and Mary Jo Downey, Jan Bootz Dittmar and Duane Dittmar, Ken and Lori Chezik, and Gary and Denise Callaghan. Research is an ongoing process at Risdon Rigs, Inc. He also wants to thank the many people who have helped him maintain this quality, Harris and Ginger Dunlap and Larry Tallman to name a few. Harris was the first to test and promote the sleds. Larry Tallman was instrumental in design of the protracker.

In 1996 ISDRA awarded Clyde Risdon a Citation of Merit in recognition of his outstanding contributions to the sport of sled dog racing through his sled making abilities, and of his design of the ever famous Risdon Rig.

This Sled will be great for a recreational musher with 1, 2 or 3 dogs. It is light and comes with a set of lines.

So how do you have a chance at it. At the next couple of meetings we will have the sled and raffle tickets. Tickets will be \$5.00 each. Drawing will be held when we sell \$200 + in tickets.


