It was a great morning for a Husky Hike. – Ann Furqua

The weather was perfect. The sky was blue and clear, not a cloud to be seen. The temperature was not too cold, not too hot but just right about 68 degrees.

This was by no means a typical Husky Hike. It began at a house in a quiet residential neighborhood of Mountain View which led to an entrance onto the Steven's Creek Trail. The hum of traffic from the distant roadways broke the silence on the trail. Over bridges above dry creek beds, down tree lined paths, the dogs and owners walked and talked.

Ann and Whiskey led the pack followed by Patty and her three dogs - Emma, Yuri and Draco. At the rear were Brian, Candace, son Reece and their dog, Sly.

The trail was peaceful and scenic and not yet busy. A handful of joggers, walkers and bicyclists passed by. The dogs and owners walked on, eventually exiting the trail into another quiet residential neighborhood with tree lined streets also picturesque in its own right.

Residential roads gave way to Down Town Mountain View. A peaceful walk on the City sidewalk and over the rail road tracks led the group back to the beginning of the trek. Goodbyes were exchanged and as quickly and quietly as when the group first got together, they dispersed. Another successful Husky Hike completed.









Rescuing/fostering dogs has changed with the times

When BASH first started rescuing huskies in 1994, our only way of advertising those dogs that were available was mailing a newsletter out, putting an ad in the local newsletter and people coming to adoption fairs to meet the dogs. With all of the many ways using the internet we can now search for both rescue dogs and pure bred dogs, but many that search don't do the research....you can find what you want someplace in the United States and then see if you can get them to you. One of the big changes that BASH has been doing for a few years but it has really picked up this last year is helping place dogs that are in our area, but we can't take them directly into our foster homes. This reserves the space for some of those in shelters. BASH is constantly contacted by people that want to place their dog NOW...some for very valid reasons and others not...but we attempt to help them all.

We still pull who we have room for from local shelters. How do we help others now? The first is to encourage the person that wants to surrender their dog to post their dog on SHRRCA.com. A website created by Randy Fishel almost 20 years ago to place northern breed dogs in California, Nevada and Oregon. The dog must be altered to be posted on this list. We give them recommendations on what to write in the bio (honesty is the best) and a good photo.

The second is to help people that want to help with a specific dog. BASH requires that a foster home be a member for at least 6 months to foster for us so that the person understands how "WE" do things in our rescue. A person wants to rescue a dog needing rehoming or one that they see in the shelter. They contact us to rescue it, but we have no room. The option is that as long as they are close to us, they take the dog, we will help them place the dog. We will supply food to the foster home (what we receive in donations), courtesy post on all the websites we use, allow them to come to an adoption fair if we have room and support in any other way that we can by mentoring them. We can also help with limited medical assistance and behavioral training.

The third is that there is a special dog- older, has a medical issue that we can't find a foster for (pregnant husky) and a few other reasons.... we post on our social media to find a person that will take the dog and BASH will support them as we can. An example is a Siberian that was said to be 13 years old. A wonderful person was willing to take him into her home and take care of him. We helped her pull him from the shelter and paid for a check up visit at our vet and are mentoring her with issues as they come up. Another was a family in Turlock that took a pregnant Siberian...she had 8 puppies at their house... they took care of it all...we mentored them in the medical and how to find low cost spay/neuters, know what shots and worming that they needed and when (which they did) When they were ready to be posted for adoption we courtesy posted them. They were able to recoup the money they had spent ...and all found great new homes.

The fourth is smaller but time consuming (but is easily done at night). We watch all the shelters that BASH covers and we post all of the Siberians that they have up for adoption. We put what

information we can get on the dog (from their websites and or some of their personnel will send it to us) along with pictures from the shelters sites. We encourage people to adopt from the shelters. If a northern breed dog is adopted from a shelter near us, BASH will pay for one hour with a CERTIFIED trainer. All of the shelters know we do this, but they don't always remember to tell people.

The fifth but not last is that we are open to ideas. The key is that we can't do anything that is a liability to BASH. It has to be something that a person within BASH can manage or help manage. Some ideas that have been proposed and tried in the past, fail because there is no follow through with those we are attempting to help or the person helping expects more than we can do.

Interesting in helping? You don't have to take a dog...but sometimes we need dogs transported from a shelter to a foster home, from a foster to the vet and back, taking dog food or other supplies to a foster home, help picking up and unloading dog food that is donated, watching a foster dog for a day or two when a foster goes on vacation (we know most about the dog because they are in our homes), posting the dogs on the website that are in adoptions at shelters, posting on social media and much more. Do you have other ideas as to what to do? Please share them.

Peanut Butter Sandwiched Dog Treats

Ingredients:

- 1 1/4 cup flour, plus a little extra for cutting dough
- 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 cup creamy peanut butter
- 1 large egg
- 2 tablespoons honey
- 1/2 cup milk
- additional peanut butter for sandwiching

Directions:

Preheat oven to 350°F. Line two baking sheets with parchment paper, set aside.

In a large bowl (or stand mixer), combine all ingredients, beating until a soft dough forms.

Dust counter with flour. Pat out dough into a large rectangle, about 1 inch in depth. Using a 1 1/2 inch circle shaped cookie cutter, cut into circles. Use all dough.

Bake for 10 to 12 minutes, or until they are a uniform color on top (as they bake, the color will actually lighten instead of darken). Transfer to a wire rack and let cool completely.

When your pup deserves a treat, smear a little peanut butter in the center of two cookies and sandwich them together!

I store these cookies without the peanut butter in the center. Then when I want to give Brody a treat, I put some fresh peanut butter in the center and sandwich the cookies together right before I hand it to him. The treats stay fresh for much longer this way (up to 2 weeks).



We will be having a Rescue/Foster meeting prior to our General Meeting

in August. As stated in the article above many things have changed over the years and we have attempted to update and modify as needed. Currently there is a great need for foster homes which is not happening, so we need to think of more ways to save huskies from shelters. While trying to find more answers to the problem, we need to make sure what we do will work and help BASH and the dogs we help. We always have to consider liability for the club. Everything takes time of someone. Many have ideas, but no time to help with those ideas. Paperwork especially has to be done, whether on the internet, our data base, microchip data base and/or our accounting....and when the process is not completed, it can cause a problem for a dog and/or the club.


I wanted to take a moment to introduce myself...My name is Sherrie and I am a volunteer content creator for BASH's posts on Facebook and Instagram.

I first came across Bay Area Siberian Husky Club when our family was casually browsing online for another dog to fill our home (we already have a 3+ year old Siberian Husky). We saw Joey's (formerly known as Gauge) profile online and were intrigued to meet him. We were told that the previous owner got him when he was only a few weeks old from a backyard breeder. They had young children, along with other huskies in their home, and they underestimated the work it took to take care of a puppy in the chaos of all that.

Because they were busy caring for their children most of the time, they care for Joey properly, so he was malnourished and often resourced guarded food and toys because he had to fight for them from the other dogs in the house.

We were saddened to hear that and knew that we could provide a much better life for him. He's been with us for over a year now and is growing and thriving!

Having our family adopt Joey was a great thing for us, and definitely an eye opener for me into the stories and real issues there are with breeders, animal treatment, overcrowding at shelters, etc. that our community is experiencing. I knew in my heart that there was something I could do to help. Temperament Testing Dixon Fair Grounds October 26, 27

Check out the website ATTS.org for more information about the test.

Provide for a uniform national program of temperament testing of purebred and spayed/neutered mixed-breed dogs. The test takes about 12 minutes to complete. The dog is on a loose six-foot (6') lead and three ATTS trained evaluators score the dog. Majority rules. Failure on any part of the test is recognized when a dog shows panic, strong avoidance without recovery or unprovoked aggression. They do 10 tests. Start with neutral stranger, friendly stranger, hidden noise, gun test (how they react to the noise and recover) umbrella test (reaction to it opening) walking on a grate, walking on plastic and ends with three that are with a weird stranger.

For me it helped me understand how my dog reacts to things. Years ago I had one that was very shy and I was worried about aggression if she got to scared....she did not pass because of the umbrella but I learned a great deal about her reactions and learned she was never likely to be aggressive when scared.

Last year a few BASH people joined me in testing. You can be an apprentise tester without experience. When you are new you work with others that do have experience. All that came really enjoyed and learned about dogs and their behaviors by doing the testing.
