June Husky Hike

Come and join us for a Husky Hike! All breeds of dogs are welcome! The Hike will be Saturday June 15th at Garin/ Dry Creek Park in Union City.

Please arrive by <u>8 am</u>. If you wish, bring some beverages and snacks for both you and your dogs. There is a lovely area with picnic tables by a pond where we can take a break. We will be starting the hike by <u>8:30</u> sharp. We will be meeting at the May Road park entrance near the Dry Creek Apartment complex. This is a small parking lot so the earlier you arrive the better. It may fill up by <u>8 am</u>. If it does there is street parking. We will walk the High Ridge Loop Trail (Sunny) to Jordan Pond. This is where the picnic area is where we can take a break, water the dogs, have a snack and use the restrooms. We will then return on the Dry Creek Trail (Shady) Please look up the Park on <u>EBparks.org</u> for a trail map. And also to look at the other trails if you wish to continue hiking on your own after we return to the parking lot. There are a lot of beautiful trails in this park. This hike is very child friendly with lots of things for children to explore. And although some trails are designated off leash do not let your dog off leash on this hike as there are also off leash cattle in the area, especially at the beginning of the trail.



Three Little Ferns

I recently learned about the benefits of including gelatin in a dog's diets. Gelatin can be especially helpful for older dogs (the groomers labeled Caesar as a senior (a)) or those prone to joint issues, as it helps reduce joint inflammationAdditional perks of supplementing gelatin in your dog's diet include:


- healthier nails
- it supports the growth and development of cartilage
- it supports a healthy skin and coat

Gelatin Peanut Butter Dog Treats

Ingredients

• 1 cup chicken broth*, divided

2 packets unflavored gelatin



Instructions

- 1. Pour 1/2 cup of cold chicken broth into a large measuring cup. Sprinkle the unflavored gelatin over the cold chicken broth and allow it to bloom for about 5 minutes.
- 2. While the gelatin blooms, combine the other 1/2 cup of chicken broth and peanut butter in a microwave safe bowl or measuring cup. Microwave at 15 second intervals, stirring in between, until the peanut butter melts and combines smoothly with the chicken broth (about 60 seconds total). The peanut butter/broth mixture should be hot.
- 3. Pour the peanut butter mixture into the gelatin mixture and whisk until completely combined and no chunks of gelatin remain.
- 4. Pour the mixture into shaped silicon molds and allow to cool slightly, before transferring to the refrigerator. Refrigerate for at least 3 hours, then store

in an airtight container in the fridge for up to a week.



Notes

This recipe nearly fills a large silicon mold with 15 cavities. I've made a half-batch that perfectly filled <u>this</u> smaller mold set.

- *Verify that chicken broth does not contain onion or garlic
- **Peanut butter **MUST** be xylitol free

March 14, 15, 16 - 13 members of out club joined together for an easy 6 mile trip into Bear Trap Basin to a secluded ski cabin at Bear Valley. This was suppose to be a simple weekend sledding trip that turned into something much larger. The trails we were suppose to be able to find were not there and the easy climb was steep both up and down. We were suppose to get in in a couple of hours. It took 2 days. The first night we snow camped rather than risk problems in the dark. Over the next few months I hope that various members contribute with tales of the weekend. The most important was that we were friends when we went in and better friends when we came out. We all learned different things from sledding skills to working as a team and more.....

What I learned during the BASH "Iditarod"

- 1. I learned about Friendship
 - standing around a huge bonfire in the snow
 - sharing smoked salmon on a hard reached summit
 - -toasting naturally chilled white wine in an old cabin
- 2) I learned about Teamwork:
 - falling flat on my face and having my partner catch the sled
 - my partner falling flat on his face and me having to catch the sled
 - both of us falling flat on our faces and getting dragged by the sled
 - helping others push 150+ pound sleds up steep inclines
 - helping to stop 150+ pound sleds on steep declines
 - getting across ice bridges with sheer drops on either side
 - a lead dog's glance to let you know he is ready to pull again
- 3) I learned about snow and ice and how they feel on various parts of my body when contacted at various rates of speed and in various positions.
- 4) I learned about sleds:
 - they are not quite as maneuverable as one would like
 - they are a bitch to get out of a tree well
 - they are a impossible to stop going down hill in deep powder
 - they are strong enough to hit many trees head on at full speed and stay together
 - they are hard to flip over intentionally
 - they are easy to flip over unintentionally
- 5) I learned about equipment.
 - next time I'm carrying a break repair kit, an Alaskan brake and alead dog holder
 - next time I'm remembering my lines instead of leaving them in the basement of my house
 - always keep bungees and neck lines clipped to your sled so you can tie things down such as extra mittens, a gee ling for the occasitonal dog who chews himself loose (TERUU) and comes racing down the trail.
- 6) I learned about me and the things I can accomplish.
- Most important I learned about me and the things I can accomplish.
- 7) I learned RESPECT -RESPECT for our dogs who tirelessly pulled for three straight days over an unmarked trail because we asked them to.
